EVERY TRUE LOVE IS A



REVOLUTIONARY LOVE There is no single revolution in world history that has not involved love and in, one way or the other – dystopian or utopian – the transformation of our most intimate spheres.

From the Paris Commune and the Haitian Revolution to the October Revolution and the Yugoslav Revolution, and most recently from the Zapatista Revolution to the Rojava Revolution: throughout centuries, all great revolutions were guided not only by their programmatic vision of a new political economic order: They were also guided by the feeling of love — by a flowering sense of sisterhood and brotherhood with fellow comrades at the barricades, in the factories, or operating together as guerrillas in the mountains.

The early laws drafted by the great feminist Alexandra Kollontai during the October Revolution, from legalising divorce, abortion, homosexuality and decriminalising prostitution, tackled social reproduction and women's liberation in a way that seems radical from today's perspective in many corners of the world – and increasingly in Europe, too.

Love is today a lost chapter in the history of revolution, just as revolution has been denied its place in the history of love.

The recovery of these lost chapters reveals fascinating and far-reaching debates between figures such as Alexandra Kollontai, Vladimir Ilych Lenin, Clara Zetkin, Che Guevara and today's social movements about the role of love in the revolutionary transformation of social, sexual, and familial relations.

What happened since all these profound revolutions? Why do laws introduced back in 1917 look like science-fiction, while *Handmaid's Tale* today looks like dystopian reality? How did love and the libidinal economy fall prey of capitalist commodification, at the same time being dictated by populist and autocratic leaders and alienated by algorithms that program us as to how and what to desire? Can love save the Earth?

How can we reclaim the revolutionary power of love again? And how can precisely love itself be reinvented in order not only to give us a better understanding of ourselves and the world, but also to change ourselves and the world itsef?

These are just some of the burning questions that *Revolutionary Love* will reflect deeper and take forward during the exciting program at this year's Vienna Festival (Wiener Festwochen) with an incredible line up of leading philosophers, artists, writers and social activists.

We live in a time in which words can become weapons as quickly as they can be drowned out by the sound of wars. Still, literature is able to write that which can often not be said. The two renowned contemporary writers Adania Shibli and Eva Menasse discuss Love and Language in Times of Turmoil.

Eva Menasse, one of Austria's most significant contemporary authors, wrote her first novel *Vienna* about a family with half Jewish, half Christian roots in twentieth century Austria. Her novel *Dunkelblum* about historical guilt, the question of remembrance and the devastating power of silence became an absolute bestseller.

Palestinian writer **Adania Shibli** is one of the most exciting voices in contemporary fiction. She has received numerous awards for her works, which have been translated into many languages. Her novel *Minor Detail* (2020) was also nominated for the International Booker Prize.

If you love the world, you must change it. But the two – doubtlessly controversial – guests in this debate of the *Revolutionary Love* series certainly have no romantic intentions. They want to discuss why the future seems to be so hopeless and how radical new perspectives would contribute to liberating humanity. Are humans lost in light of the rise of crisis, violence and dispossession through global capitalism, or is there still a way out?

Karl-Heinz Dellwo is a former member of the Red Army Faction and has been working as a publisher and documentary film maker since his release from prison in 1995. He published books with Laika Verlag publishing company for many years and has recently co-founded Galerie der abseitigen Künste.

Gabriele Rollnik Gabriele Rollnik was a member of the 2 June Movement and has been working as a child and youth therapist since her release from prison in 1992. A graphic novel about her was recently published: ELLA ... nichts haben, alles ändern [ELLA ... having nothing, changing everything].

Imogena Doderer directs the conversation; she is a film maker and journalist for the Austrian broadcasting service ORF.

Total Refusal

In 2019, two years before the United States Capitol attack in Washington D. C., the uprising was already playable: In the video blockbuster *Tom Clancy's: The Division 2*, players are tasked with liberating the halls of US democracy from the True Sons, a civilian militia that bears a striking resemblance to real paramilitary groups like the Proud Boys. These prophetic parallels serve as the starting point for Total Refusal's research. They are self-proclaimed media guerrillas, a Viennese collective of artists, researchers and film makers who appropriate mainstream formats to transform them into political narratives. In the live gaming lecture performance *Sons and True Sons*, which was updated for *Trump 2.0*, the collective re- and de-storms the Capitol and connects the dots between the hyper-militarised gaming world, politically motivated misogyny and the narrative decay of liberal democracy.

RADIO FRIDA

ISSA - Island School of Social Autonomy

In a world ravaged by endless war, climate collapse and the rise of fascism, what if the radio is not a relic but a tool of revolution for the future? At the site of the former 'Reichssender Wien', a workshop with ISSA (the Island School of Social Autonomy) creates Radio Frida – a name that recalls the German word for peace, 'Frieden', as well as the title of a famous post-Yugoslav pop song. ISSA is an international school on the Croatian island of Vis that tries out and cultivates forms of exchanging knowledge and autonomy as political strategy. This is its first guest visit to Vienna. The two-day workshop entails both practical and theoretical experiments with pirate radio technology. Setting out from previous emancipatory uses of radio, we revive the practices of urban pirate radio, rethink and implement them. It is time to use the radio waves for a global wave of resistance – for a world that rests on justice, equality and love.

PLANETS OF LOVE AND REVOLUTIONS

Kurdwin Ayub and Farahnaz Sharifi **Moderation** Matthias Seier

'Revolution' originally described the movement of planets around the sun. This thought serves as the starting point for the conversation Planets of Love and Revolutions with Iranian film maker Farahnaz Sharifi and Iragi-born Austrian director Kurdwin Ayub - two extraordinary artists who explore female freedom and the limits it is set. The conversation is preceded by a showing of the films Moon by Ayub and My Stolen Planet by Sharifi. My Stolen Planet is a mesmerising diary style film.

Farahnaz Sharifi, born in 1979 during the Islamic Revolution, captures everyday moments of inner freedom and outer repression - it is a unique perspective on loss and the value of memories.

Kurdwin Ayub is an Austrian film-maker, scriptwriter and artist with Iragi-Kurdish roots. She was born in Süleymaniyya in 1990 and lives in Vienna. Her works alternate between film, performance and fine arts. She became known for her autobiographical documentary film Paradise! Paradise! and the feature film Sonne (Sun), which received awards and accolades at international festivals. The thriller Mond (Moon) was a highlight at many international film festivals and provides a disturbing insight into the modern-day oppression of women.

ŞEYDA KURT

POLITICS OF RADICAL TENDERNESS

What role do emotions play in revolutionary work for a good life for all? What forms of connection and relationship-building exist beyond bourgeois, romantic love, and how can these anticipate an egalitarian and solidaristic future that we are fighting for, in the present? In her lecture, Şeyda Kurt explores Radical Tenderness as a program of social justice. She questions romantic love as a tool of patriarchal capitalism and contrasts it with the ideas of revolutionary thinkers such as Alexandra Kollontai and

bell hooks. She also engages with the idea of the Commons as radical spaces where people can reshape their knowledge and relationships. Finally, she takes us to Rojava, where the autonomous self-governance in North and East Syria is experimenting with radical tenderness practices and politics as the basis for a new societal model.



Seyda Kurt is a German journalist and author. She studied philosophy, Romance studies and cultural journalism in Cologne, Bordeaux and Berlin. In her book Radical Tenderness - Why Love is Political (2021), she outlines a concept of "radical tenderness" as a programme of justice. Her most recent book Hate - The Uses of a Powerful Emotion (2023) examines strategic hatred as a powerful force driving resistance, abolition, and even, paradoxically perhaps, radical care.

NIKOLAJ SCHULTZ

WHY ,LOVING NATURE' WON'T SAVE THE EARTH: ON THE NEED FOR CLASS STRUGGLE IN ECOLOGY

Love is great, but not always sufficient. At & Schultz, 2022), he argues that instead least this seems to be one of the lessons to draw for political ecology. For a long time, this political endeavour was certain that love for nature and care for the Earth would unite us all and mobilise people for climate action. However, today we know this was not the case. Despite ecological catastrophes growing in scale and proximity, we are still not acting. Nikolaj Schultz is a Danish sociologist and leading figure in contemporary social theory and ecological thought. His work explores the intersection of sociology, politics and the climate crisis. Schultz was a close collaborator of the late French philosopher Bruno Latour (1947-2022), with whom he co-authored On the Emergence of an Ecological Class: A Memo (2023). Schultz's solo work, Land Sickness (2023), a hybrid auto-ethnographic essay, delves into the existential and sociological questions posed by the anthropocene. His innovative approach has resonated with both academics and artists, marking him as a significant emerging voice in ecological and sociological discourse.

ECE TEMELKURAN

TOGETHER AGAINST THE HEARTLESS WORLD

Love without a smirk. In our age of radical cynicism, it is difficult to utter two words without a self-cancelling smirk: Revolution and love. And that smirk is the very sign of our loss in humankind. That loss stands before all the possibilities for a better future. That loss and, thus, that smirk is not our choice; the neoliberal moral structure has imposed it on us.

A better world is only possible if we can drop that smirk of cynicism and talk about political love with spotless faith. "Together: Manifesto Against the Heartless World" is a treatise dedicated to that spotless faith we all secretly yearn for. It is time to discuss what we lost in the last decades: human love and faith in our kind.



Ece Temelkuran is an award-winning Turkish novelist, a political thinker, and a public speaker whose work has appeared in the Guardian, New York Times, Le Monde, La Stampa, New Statesman, and Der Spiegel, among several international media outlets. She won the Edinburgh International Book Festival First Book award for her novel Women Who Blow On Knots and the Ambassador Of New Europe Award for her book Turkey: The Insane and the Melancholy. She is the author of the internationally acclaimed book How to Lose a Country. Together: A Manifesto Against the Heartless World, her latest book has been published in several languages. Currently she is based in Berlin.

LOVE AT THE END OF THE WORLD

In a world of mass extinction, war, climate crisis, Al and tech-fascism, to speak of love might sound naive. But what if it is exactly love that should be saved, reaffirmed and reinvented today? And moreover, what if the concept of revolutionary love can give us a possible anchor faced with the ends of the world and serve as a

useful tool to deconstruct and break out of the prevailing apocalyptic Zeitgeist? Through a rollercoaster ride through revolutionary history and our postapocalyptic present, we'll arrive to (revolutionary) love at the end of the world.

DAVID WENGROW

FREEDOM, REVOLUTION AND LOVE

How does our understanding of freedom shape our most basic ways of relating to each other in terms of friendship, comradeship, and love? How do such intimate relationships define the possibilities of revolutionary social change? Is freedom a political value that has only developed under specific sets of historical circumstances? Or a universal capacity and potential in all human relations?

Such questions have been asked many times before, but the answers have often revolved around a strikingly limited set of alternatives, defined by the "Western" canon of ideas. Wengrow's talk explores new avenues in the investigation of human freedoms, based on three principles: the freedom to move away, the freedom to disobey, and the freedom to create new forms of social reality.



David Wengrow is a British archaeologist and Professor of Comparative Archaeology at the Institute of Archaeology, University College London. He has conducted archaeological fieldwork in Africa and the Middle East, and is the author of books including The Archaeology of Early Egypt: Social Transformations in North-East Africa, c. 10,000–2650 BC, What Makes Civilization? The Ancient Near East and the Future of the West, The Origins of the Monsters: Image & Cognition in the First Age of Mechanical Reproduction, as well as academic articles on topics such as the origins of writing, ancient art, Neolithic societies, and the emergence of the first cities and states. Together with David Graeber he co-authored the international bestseller The Dawn of Everything: A New History of Humanity.

Eva Illouz, director of studies at the School for Advanced Studies in Social Sciences (EHESS) in Paris and Senior Professor of Theory of Emotions & Modernity at Zeppelin University, is one of the most influential voices in sociology today. Her work explores several significant and thought-provoking themes, such as the influence of capitalism on emotions, the commodification of romance and the meaning of freedom, choice, and individualism in the modern world. Several of her major works are Cold Intimacies: The Making of Emotional Capitalism, Why Love Hurts, Hard Core Romance, Emotions as Commodities, and most recently The Emotional Life of Populism and Explosive Modernity.
